



There are a number of staff changes in 2022.

#### **Troop Movements**



After 30 years teaching at Matairangi Clyde Quay Kerry is finishing up at the end of the year. Of course Kerry is reluctant to do so however, she has to be cognizant of her well-being. She has taught, three generations of children.

If you're the new entrant teacher, you receive all children. In the late 1980s the government moved to mainstreaming aka deinstitutionalizing akonga students. It enshrined in legislation the right of every child to attend their local school, irrespective of exceptionality.

Kerry had the privilege of teaching the first mainstreamed child to attend Clyde Quay. It was a natural progression from this to act as the Special Education Needs Coordinator. When you're in a school for this length of time you hold most positions: acting principal (while full time teaching), associate principal, senior teacher, reading recovery teacher, staff representative, pre-service education liaison, associate teacher, tutor teacher (a number of student teachers returned to teach here) NZEI stalwart and it goes on.

It's not news to most that Kerry is instrumental in making CQS library one of the best. National library personnel comment frequently, the school has a superb collection. Kerry has managed the collection since 1995 and started the iconic Book BBQ.

**STOP PRESS** You can't keep a good person down. Kerry intends to volunteer in the library helping to support students to become more confident readers. It makes sense and its 'Fantastic' for us!

### Amanda Thornton Pohutukawa Whānau

Amanda started here as a volunteer, then a part timer, next she trained for reading recovery and is also our go to tutor for our English Language Learners. Many teachers have observed Amanda teaching reading recovery and if you've had a child on the programme you probably came to watch her teaching your child.

Amanda is off to the mainland (as those hailing from Te Waipounamu say). She tells us she's retiring but I've heard that before. There's many who retire next minute they've reinvented themselves and morphed; taking on a new position. Amanda will definitely be enjoying Collingwood and the Golden Bay area.

### Sandy O'Brien Karaka Whānau

Sandy is off on study leave. She is the recipient of a Ministry of Education teacher study award. Sandy is off to Te Whare Wananga o Aotearoa to study 'Te Reo Māori' for 2022. We however, will not be letting her off that easily. Wananga is 32 weeks so she'll probably be here to teach before study starts and at the end of it.

#### **Mel Sutton**

As reported last week Mel Sutton has been successful in gaining a Principal role at Te One Primary School (Chatham Islands) and will be starting this new role in Term 1 2022. CQS appointed Mel as deputy principal in 2017. Mel spearheaded BYOD and professional development in upskilling staff in digital technologies. For the first two years, Mel taught with Sandy O'Brien in the senior school. Her role changed in 2019 - to take full advantage of her expertise in the arts and technology. As a result, Mel acted as a subject specialist, teaching in Y2-8 when teachers were on senior release/ or classroom release time. Mel has also held the staff representative position on the Board. She has had a huge impact in her 4 years here at Clyde Quay School and will be greatly missed by the CQS community, students, staff and whānau. ### Whānau 2022

**Harakeke:** Xandra Boswell and Janessa Naran will move from Pohutukawa to Harakeke (Y0-1). They will be supported by Mel Yiappos and Sanja Mandinic.

She has undertaken teaching practicum in the Whakatane Mataatua rohe/area, at Allandale and Apanui. These are schools of 400 plus children. Both Jayne's associate teachers rate her.



### **Ngaio**

There are no teaching changes; Joseph McAuley and Anya MacDonald will consolidate their approach to Y5-6 teaching. As they did this year, their team will significantly strengthen the Y5-8 whanau.

**Rimu:** Leon Davidson and Max Allen will be joined by Keith Hutton (former CQS teacher) in Y7-8.

**Cameron Ross** will act as deputy principal from the junior area of the school. He will pick up many of the digital and ICT responsibilities Mel Sutton holds.

It is important to remember that children, no matter which whānau, will be taught by all the teachers in their respective whānau. As you know staff work as teams hence collaboratively. 

## IRD Rebate on Whanau Donations in 2022

Clyde Quay has arranged to recover the tax component of families' annual donations via the Kindo app. Kindo uses a function offered by Supergenerous.

You don't need to do anything right now, but when you make your school donation to Clyde Quay through Kindo for 2022, you'll see the option to opt-in to Supergenerous at the time of payment. Kindo and Supergenerous work together to lodge your donation rebate claim with the IRD

If you are not set up on Kindo, please register at <u>kindo.co.nz</u>. More reminders to come in 2022.

This doesn't cost you anything. It just means that IRD reimburses the tax component of your donation – and gives it back to the school. This amounts to an extra 33% donation for the good of the School.
